

What Michigan Lost UNDER THE REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH ACT



Abortion is now **legal in Michigan through all nine months of pregnancy** and for any reason. Additionally, as a result of the passage of the Reproductive Health Act in 2023, many longstanding commonsense safeguards have been struck from law, significantly increasing the risks for women. This reality is underscored by an already realized **38% rise in serious complications from abortion** being reported, the final year in which such reporting was required.*

- **MICHIGAN REQUIRES ABORTION REPORTING**
 - Michigan Department of Health and Human Services releases annual abortion reports to the public
- **REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH ACT (RHA) SIGNED BY GOVERNOR WHITMER**
 - No requirement for abortion providers to report data, meaning no public abortion data available from the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services
 - No standard health and safety regulations for abortion clinics
- **LAST FULL PUBLIC ABORTION STATISTICS REPORT**
 - 38% increase in serious abortion complications
- **WOMEN ARE AT AN UNPRECEDENTED RISK** to their health and well-being when they choose to have an abortion
